ACORNS

This term Year 1 and Year 2 have been writing stories based upon the book, The owl who was afraid of the dark. The development of writing is a strong area at Bibury C of E Primary School as noted by the DGAT Quality Assurance Lead who visited us recently. EYFS have been hearing the story of The Gruffalo and we have produced some of our own independent writing based on the story.

In Maths we have been exploring 3D and 2D shapes as well as adding and subtracting money. The children have become very skilled in being able to talk about the maths they are exploring.

In Science we have been looking at light and dark, looking at sources of light, and exploring how materials block light as well as allowing light through.

Later in the term we have been investigating nocturnal animals and in English we will be writing a non-chronological report about what we have discovered.

In Art Mrs Russell has helped the children develop their self-portrait drawing skills.

OAKS

Oaks class have been exploring topics from multiplication and division in Maths to writing in the style an author in English, from states of matter in Science to constructing strong structures in DT. All of which have been incredibly fun and have produced wonderful results.

In Science, Oaks have needed to answer some tricky questions such as 'Does wax, butter, chocolate or ice have the highest melting point?' and 'How can I tell whether a material is not a solid?'. In order to answer these, we have predicted our answers, planned our tests and carried them out fairly before analysing our results and making a conclusion. There has been lots of excellent scientific thinking going into all of these investigations.

Our DT topic on construction has consisted of two separate forms of building. Our first few weeks were spent meeting different design briefs such as 'Build a vehicle with no more than 4 wheels that can carry a book across a distance of 2 metres'. Children had to plan, design, build out of K'NEX and evaluate their model against the judging criteria whilst also considering things like 'How could this design be more environmentally friendly?'. As we have journeyed into the last weeks of term, the children have moved onto constructing their own model houses with working doorbell and light features.

A term filled with lots of enjoyment and plenty of hard work. Well done, Oaks!

MIGHTY OAKS

This term, Mighty Oaks have been learning about different materials in science. We particularly enjoyed using edible 'foam' to try and prevent ice cubes from melting in the oven - we discovered that meringue mixture worked particularly well.

In English, we have written some lovely imaginative poetry entitled 'If I were' or 'If I could' as well as a story based on Neil Gaiman's 'The Graveyard Book'. We are now going to write a letter to Mr. Scrooge to try and convince him to embody the spirit of Christmas. In maths, we have completed our work on arithmetic and can now use efficient methods to calculate with all four operations. Our geography work this term has looked at how and why places have changed over time.

This week, we looked at maps of Cirencester, Fairford and Bibury from 35 years ago and compared them with the present day. The children were surprised by how much the trout farm has grown, and discovered that there used to be a police office in the village!


