Summer is finally here! This term in PE the children have been developing their fielding and catching skills ready for the cricket season to begin. We are lucky to be so close to the village cricket pitch and we make the most of the glorious weather and space the cricket field affords us.





ACORNS

Acorn Class have been very busy again this month. We have been writing in the present tense using the popular book, Traction Man as our stimulus. The children have really impressed us with their use of complex techniques in their writing such as the use of alliteration, repetition and onomatopoeia. In Maths, we have been getting to grips with how we measure length, height, mass and capacity - despite the frequent rain showers we have made good use of the outdoor learning area to develop these very practical skills. Early Years have also been busy developing their mathematical and writing skills and they are now well on their way to meeting their end goals for the reception year. This week they have enjoyed playing with our new loose parts obstacle course which allows them to build, climb and work together to make larger structures.

In science we have been exploring coastal habitats and the creatures found in rock pools. We had a fascinating lesson exploring the structures of fish with some trout kindly donated by Bibury Trout Farm. We will develop our understanding of different animals with a look at invertebrates next term.

Acorns have enjoyed over three hours of PE per week this month with the additional PE provided by Mr Witham every Monday. Today we were able to make good use of the sunny weather with the PE lesson held on the cricket pitch. These provided excellent conditions for practising the ever-important fielding and striking skills.

Music lessons continue to provide the children with valuable experiences. The children have really enjoyed their lessons with the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra and they now have a much deeper understanding of the elements of a real orchestra. Acorns have enjoyed developing their body percussion techniques as well as experimenting with composition using our wide range of musical instruments.

OAKS

Oaks Class have well and truly earnt their half term break! We have been working incredibly hard in so many exciting areas. Our English work has been out of this world. Literally! We have been writing non-chronological reports on the planets within our Solar System. This required a lot of careful fact finding, diagram drawing and precise planning before we could put pencil to paper. The final reports were a very exciting and interesting read. Our art lessons have taken us through the worlds of some the greatest artists. From Claude Monet to Jackson Pollock, we have explored painting techniques, colour choices and personal artistic styles. It has been wonderful to hear the children talking so passionately about their own taste in art! The science investigations have continued throughout this month. Last week, we explored and observed the impact of bicarbonate of soda on honeycomb and toffee. This week, we predicted, planned and tested four different types of bread dough to examine the impact of using yeast. Lots of fabulous learning in May. Let's keep it up!

MIGHTY OAKS

During May, the children in years 5 and 6 have been learning how to write non-chronological reports, which culminated in them researching and writing their own pieces of work about creatures during the past week. They have discovered some truly fascinating species and set high expectations for themselves to produce writing of high quality. They have been learning more about the geography of Europe and chose a place to 'visit' virtually, exploring the physical and human features of their chosen destination. In science, we have continued to learn about the classification of different organisms, which included an investigation into the best conditions for fungi to grow - we produced some excellent (scientifically) mouldy bread over a 2-week period, particularly when damp and kept in dark places. If your children refuse to put loaves in the bread bin, they do so with scientific evidence to back them up!

They have all really enjoyed their art sessions with Miss de Carles, experimenting with different painting techniques and creating some lovely pieces of work. Our beefriendly seeds are now beginning to grow and, with our environmental pledges completed, I have submitted our application to Blue Peter for our green badges. Hopefully, this will be approved and we will receive them before we break for summer.

BOURNEMOUTH SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA

We have to say a huge thank you to the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra for the wonderful free resource 'Explore the Orchestra' which they have made available for streaming over the last 5 weeks. All the children in the school have really enjoyed learning about the instruments of the orchestra through the beautiful pieces of music arranged and performed for these sessions. Especially enjoyable was the opportunity to take part in the final performance, joining in with the challenging body percussion accompaniments.
