TALK ABOUT FORGIVENESS TOGETHER.

Zacchaeus wanted to turn over a new leaf because Jesus believed that everyone deserved a new start and now Zacchaeus believed it too!

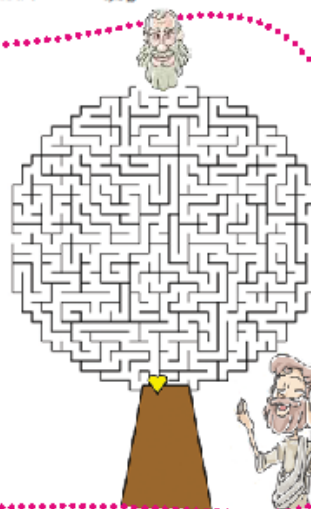

ACORNS CLASS

March has been another busy month in Acorn Class. In English we have been learning about legends and we have used the story of *George and the Dragon* to learn how to write effectively in this genre. This week the children have been asked to use what they have learnt to write their own legend and I look forward to reading the finished stories.

In Maths, all year groups have been working on measure. We have made good use of the outside learning area to practise our skills in measuring length, height, mass and capacity.

Our Explorers Day completed our history topic on Famous Explorers and we had a very enjoyable time with our friends at North Cerney Primary Academy. We took part in some challenging orienteering tasks, we found out quite how hard it is to pull a heavily loaded sledge and we found out how to light a fire before enjoying some toasted marshmallows and some camp fire songs.





In Science we have been learning about polar environments and how animals are adapted to live in these conditions. We have also been learning to group animals using the terms herbivore, carnivores and omnivores. In other areas of the curriculum, Acorn Class have been putting their painting skills to good work creating some lovely pictures of their mummies for Mothers Day - I hope that you enjoyed them ! In RE, Acorn Class have been learning about the Jewish faith and they have decided to add a Mezuzah to our classroom door.

Well done Acorns, you have worked hard this term and I'm sure that you are looking forward to your Easter holidays.

OAKS CLASS

Oaks Class have enjoyed a very busy and enjoyable March both inside and outside of the classroom. Our learning in class has consisted of a wide range of wonderful work on fractions, carefully created and thoughtfully imaginative pop-up non-fiction books in DT, and some brilliant scientific investigating on how our mouths and bodies support us in eating. We have also produced some excellently spooky and intense mystery stories this month. Each child was able to choose the plot of their story and then had to remember the structure and language features that we have learnt about to make their story as mysterious as possible. Their ideas spread from a mission to find the Loch Ness monster to the disappearances of hikers in the Lake District. The vast array of ideas showed off how creative Oaks Class are! As always, they have worked incredibly hard and continue to delight me with their curious attitudes towards their learning!

Outside of the classroom, we have also been very busy! We began March with our exhibition of artwork in the church which was a superb opportunity to showcase our self-portrait sculptures from Term 3. We were all so proud and grateful to have the chance to show off our artwork.

We were also able to support a good cause this month by inviting our whole school to wear the colours of the Ukrainian flag and paint some bright and beautiful pictures of sunflowers. Both of these actions allowed Bibury to raise money to support Ukrainian refugees. Oaks Class were incredibly kind and thoughtful when painting and discussing the ways in which we must continue to support others. Our Year 4s also had the opportunity to take part in a willow weaving workshop to make wind chimes and a cross for our worship area on the playground. The children worked confidently in their team and produced some stunning pieces that have been hung up ready to be admired.

As March drew to a close, we were able to go on a fantastic trip to the Ernest Cook Trust in Fairford to take part in a river study. They measured the speed of different parts of the river, measured the depth across the width of a meander, and completed some excellent field sketches that our trip leader was very impressed with! Oaks behaved wonderfully and the whole trip was incredibly fun!

MIGHTY OAKS CLASS

Oaks and Mighty Oaks

In geography this term, we have been learning about the water cycle and rivers. We identified the different ways that rivers can begin, learned about the features of each course of the river and followed



the course of the River Thames on maps. We have also looked at major rivers in the UK and around the world. The highlight of this term's learning was our field trip to the River Coln in Fairford where we were able to make field sketches and record width, depth and speed measurements for different parts of the river.

Mighty Oaks

We are coming to the end of another very busy month of learning. In Maths, all pupils have secured an understanding of fractions, decimals and percentages; year 5 pupils have also been working on area and perimeter and have begun to use line graphs. Year 6 have all excelled at algebra and are completing a unit of work on ratio and proportion.

In English, we have been looking at detective stories and plotting our own.

We have been learning about the importance of the Torah in Judaism and how Jewish people try to live according to the rules stated in this holy text. We were fortunate to have a Zoom meeting with a member of the Cheltenham synagogue who spent an hour with the children talking to the children about Judaism and answering their questions. The pupils all wrote letters of thanks for this virtual visit.



In science, we have learned about the function of blood and the role of the heart in circulating this around the body. We all enjoyed making our own 'blood' and the children have investigated the effect of exercise on the body. This work has linked closely to our RSHE, where we have explored healthy lifestyle choices as part of our topic 'Being your Best'.

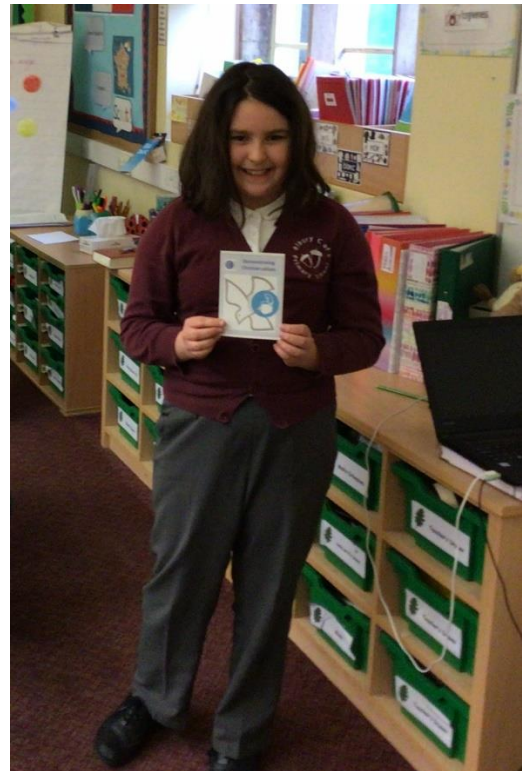
WORSHIP COUNCIL – FUNDRAISER FOR THE UKRAINE
